Dear Parent/Guardian,

Re: 2018 BC Adolescent Health Survey

Your child's class has been randomly chosen to take part in a youth health survey. McCreary Centre Society is a BC charity. We carry out the survey every five years. Schools, government, and communities use the information for planning programs.

We are inviting over 40,000 British Columbia students in Grades 7–12 to take part. Your child may choose whether or not to take part. If your child wishes to take part, your school district also requires your consent. Students who do not participate will be provided with an alternative activity by their class teacher.

The survey takes about 30–40 minutes to complete. A nurse will pass out the surveys, and students will fill it in by themselves. Question topics include feelings about school, family, physical and mental health, sexual health, substance use, injuries and activities, violence and discrimination, and technology use.

The survey is confidential and anonymous. Students do not put their name on the questionnaire. No one will be able to link answers to a particular student. However, if students choose to write their names on the survey, and say they were abused or are thinking about suicide, we have to report this to keep them safe.

Only staff and researchers connected to McCreary Centre Society will have access to the surveys. We will keep the surveys in locked offices at McCreary Centre Society for at least 5 years and then they will be shredded. Electronic data will be stored longer. Reports and fact sheets of survey results will be posted on www.mcs.bc.ca.

You or your child will not benefit directly from taking part, but if they do take part, they ensure young people have a voice in planning services and programs and will help make change where it is needed. There might be a risk of another student peeking at your son or daughter's responses, or they may feel some questions are sensitive. The nurse will be available to respond to any questions or concerns students may have. Students are also given a card with contact information for support services.
