2023 BC Adolescent Health Survey: Question topics and sources

The BC Adolescent Health Survey (BC AHS) provides information about the current health of BC youth, including new and emerging health issues, as well as information about trends over time.

The 2023 BC AHS survey items came from a variety of sources, including other youth surveys and previous versions of the BC AHS. Some questions were developed specifically for the 2023 BC AHS and were extensively piloted with youth aged 12–19 across the province. This resource summarizes the 2023 BC AHS survey item and question sources.



Question topics

| Question topic | Specific Items |
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| Background | Age, grade, gender identity, sexual orientation, family background, racial identity, religion, cultural pride, place of birth, length of time in Canada, living situation, housing instability, caretaking responsibilities, government care experience, language spoken at home |
| Economic well-being | Food security, material deprivation, hours worked and reasons for working |
| Family | Connectedness, monitoring, time together |
| School | Connectedness, school safety, reasons for absences, school plans |
| Community | Presence of caring adults, connectedness, in-person and online friendships, dating relationships, connectedness to land and nature |
| Physical health | Perceived health, health conditions and disabilities, access to health care, body image, sleep, eating behaviours, nutrition, dental care |
| Mental health | Perceived mental health, suicidality, self-harm, bereavement, subjective well-being, hopefulness, happiness, loneliness, stress and despair, access to mental health services (including virtual services), accessing reliable information on mental health |
| Injuries | Accidental injuries, concussions |
| Safety and violence | Neighbourhood safety, physical and sexual abuse, dating violence, sexual harassment, peer victimization, perpetration of violence, cyberbullying, discrimination |
| Sexual behaviour Students who have not had sex do not answer these questions | Sexual activity, age of first sex, number of partners, use of protection, history of STI's and pregnancy, helpful and inclusive sex education, accessing reliable information on sexual health |
| Substance use Students who have not used substances are instructed to skip specific questions | Alcohol, tobacco, cannabis, vaping, and other substance use; age of first use; frequency of use; consequences of use; reasons for use; problematic substance use; driving after substance use |
| Technology use | Phone use, use after bedtime, interrupted sleep, problematic social media use |
| Leisure and extracurricular activities | Participation in extracurricular activities, barriers to participation, exercise, swimming confidence, enjoyment of physical activity, gambling and gaming, problematic gambling and gaming behaviour, meaningful activity engagement |

Using previously validated items ensures questions are understood by students, and ensures the BC AHS complements other studies while providing additional information specific to BC.
