
Supporting LGBTQ Youth





Research suggests that a GSA (Gay-Straight Alliance or Gender-Sexuality Alliance) intervention in secondary schools could have positive impacts on the youth attending. A team from McCreary and SARAVYC systematically reviewed and analysed research on GSA interventions and applied the results to a 'typical' BC secondary school of 1,000 students.






Having a GSA in place for more than three years, as opposed to having no GSA, could reduce:




Fewer youth reporting binae drinkina:

Cost of GSA



The cost of implementing a GSA is about an hour's time per week for a sponser teacher or public health nurse during the school year, but could potentially save the health care system substantial amounts.
